

B EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Madura College(Autonomous), among the oldest colleges in the country, established in the year 1889.A distinguished institution with a hoary past spanning for over a century, today it strides in the current millennium with the same dynamism and intellectual verve that it has always been known for. In the current academic year, the College is offering 1 M.Phil, 9 P.G., 7 U.G. courses in the aided stream and 5 M.Phil., 5P.G., 11 U.G. courses under the self-financed stream. Currently, 6 Departments are recognized Centres for Research by MKU. At present, there are 182 faculty members of whom 63 are under the aided stream and 119 under the self-financed stream. There are 56 administrative staff (Aided: 33 & Management: 23), working in different offices and departments.

This College offers quality education to its students, in fulfillment of all the specifications laid down by the University Grants Commission, TANSCHE, the Madurai Kamaraj University (the affiliating university), the Government of Tamil Nadu and the National Assessment and Accreditation Council; it is set to welcome the third visit by the NAAC Peer Team for its appraisal of this esteemed institution.

With the vision to achieve excellence in higher education, empowerment through knowledge, inclusive growth for socio-economic change, sustainable development and for preparing students for facing global requirements, the College attempts to nurture their competence and creativity through innovations in teaching-learning, research and extension activities, including the adoption and promotion of knowledge output for human development, Women's education, optimum use of human infrastructural facilities available, participation of all the stakeholders in the development of the College, creation of awareness of Human Rights, value system, culture, heritage, scientific temper and environment.

IQAC was reconstituted in the year 2010, after the second re-accreditation in 2010, wherein the College was re-accredited with "A" Grade (CGPA 3.32 on four point scale). The IQAC of the College has developed several quality assurance mechanisms within the existing academic and administrative system. It envisions Total Quality Management, for quality sustenance and improvement in academic and administrative activities of the institution. It supports the organization of workshops, Awareness Programmes, Extension Lectures, Curricula, Teaching-Learning and Evaluation, Research Oriented Seminars, Planning/Implementation of Advanced Learning Resources, ICT Management and

Suggestions for Empowerment of Staff, Leadership and Governance patterns in Strategic Planning. It collects, maintains and analyses documents directly/through the College Office. Policies/Plans regarding Quality Assurance are Communicated in Meetings of the different Sub-committees, Teachers' Council, Non-teaching Staff Meeting, Students' Union and Alumni, and to the University, State Govt. and NAAC through different reports submitted annually (Annual Academic Report, Performance Statement, AQAR). It analyses the feedback received from all the stakeholders and informs all concerned about the outcome for action. Representatives of all Stakeholders (Management, Teachers, Non-Teaching Staff and Alumni) are present at the IQAC.

A brief survey of the Academic and Co-curricular Activities, considered Criterion-wise, shall be Worthwhile.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The 37 years of successful autonomy gives The Madura College (Autonomous) further scope and energy for continued dynamism in planning the higher education curricula. The curriculum is constantly updated and every new academic programme is strategically planned. The exposure of faculty to recent advances through participation in and organization of National/International conferences, seminars, workshops, Refresher/Orientation courses and feedback from students, alumni and academic experts give the right impetus and direction for necessary changes in our curriculum. Faculty Development Programmes on ICT based teaching-learning provide further scope for dynamism in curricula designing and restructuring. Feedback on curriculum obtained from students, academic peers, parents and stakeholders have facilitated changes of the curriculum, innovative initiatives and have ensured continuous growth. Members of our faculty, nominated by the affiliating University on its academic and research committees have made seminal contribution in making the curriculum industry-relevant by suggesting incorporation of components appropriate for the purpose. Coaching classes are arranged for NET/SET, JRF, Civil Services, PCS, Banking and Railways examinations under the UGC merger Scheme to orient the students towards career placements. Exposure to industrial organizations through industrial visits, invited talks by business experts, interface with successful entrepreneurs are arranged. Over 100 eminent resource persons in various disciplines from across India have visited the institution.

The syllabi of all UG & PG programmes have been revised after the 2nd cycle period; it facilitates Innovative Teaching-Learning process through Seminars/Workshops based on the

curriculum, audio-visual mode of teaching, study tour/excursion/field-work, project-work, survey-work, up-grading of ICT based learning resources, use of library and modernization and up gradation of laboratories. The institution has developed a questionnaire to the students for collecting feedback on Teaching, Learning & Evaluation. The college integrates the Self-financed programmes with the aided programmes in all its academic processing, in a noble bid to disband any semblance of discrimination.

CRITERION II : TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The admission policy conforms to the state guidelines for ensuring social justice by following the reservation provisions of the Government in student intake from all sections of the society. Far from being elitist, the College accommodates a large number of students from different groups like SC, ST, OBC, economically weaker sections women etc. The high proportion of women students (about 1/2) indicates a social transformation in which women empowerment through education constitutes an important element. The College follows a multi-faceted learning process which includes not only the lecture & tutorial classes, but also interactive discussions, collaborative exercises, project works, and presentations. For better dissemination of knowledge, the college utilizes various communication tools like LCD projectors and Computers provided to students and staff. Industrial, historical tours are organized for students to gain on site knowledge. Further, departmental societies regularly organize seminars, Extension-Lectures, Quizzes, Debates and other activities in their respective fields. The performance of the students and learning outcome are regularly evaluated and monitored by periodic class tests, presentations, assignments, discussions as a part of student's internal assessment while their final evaluation is made through the end of semester examination. All first year students attend orientation programme to familiarize themselves with the programme of their choice. The College sensitizes its students on gender and environmental issues through its curriculum, celebrating national/international days, organizing Awareness/sensitizing Seminar, Symposium, Drama, Quiz Competition etc. Internet facility is available for the Faculty as well as Students. There are smart classrooms in some departments. Seminar rooms are equipped with audio systems. The teachers of the College take several efforts round the year to nurture critical thinking and creativity and in developing scientific temper of the students. The College library has adequate number of text and reference books and common internet access for all with Uninterrupted Power Back-up Facility. To motivate students, the college offers a large number of prizes for outstanding academic performances as well as for excelling in the fields of Sports, NCC, NSS and extracurricular activities.

Latter UGC/Government/University laid procedure is strictly followed for recruiting faculty members, the latter continue to strive for learning and keeping abreast of the latest developments in their respective fields. The Faculty regularly participates in conferences, workshops, seminars, orientation and refresher courses and many of them are regularly invited as resource persons for such events. Further, our faculty members are also associated with the University and UGC sponsored prestigious Innovation/ Research Projects etc.

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY & EXTENSION ACTIVITIES

- College provides additional books, downloading facility (Net facility) while preparing projects. Faculty members can utilize all facilities round the year. Laptop is provided to all the departments. The essential and students" project related software are made available in common computer laboratory namely MATLAB, SPSS Package or other related software.
- Library with the latest books, Journals and Magazines.
- Inter-Library Lending Facility.
- Laboratory with all required equipment.
- The college publishes a Research Journal 'Salsearch' and Annual Magazine.
- On Other Duty leave, adjustment in teaching schedule are in vogue to faculties for participation and presentation of papers in conferences / seminars / workshops, symposia and Orientation and Refresher Courses.
- The college has Research Committee for promotion of Research.
- Seminars, Workshops, Conferences are organized by inviting eminent Researchers, Professors and Scientists. During the current assessment period, more than 100 programmes were organized by the college to promote a research culture in the college premises.
- The college encourages an interdepartmental and interdisciplinary teaching and research projects.
- The faculty members on getting PhD are honoured with a humble cash award of Rs.1000/- by the management.

- ◆ The Department of Economics offers M.Phil.,and Ph.D., from 2010-11 and 84 M.Phil. Scholars and 10 Ph.D, Scholars have been awarded with the degrees by the Madurai Kamaraj University.
- 625 Research articles have been published by the faculty members in the National and International journals.
- ◆ The college has published a few Books, a few Edited Books and Conference Proceedings during the current assessment period.
- Citation Index ranges from 1-42, Impact Factor ranges from 0.2 to 3.26 and h-index ranges from 0-2.
- Natural fertilizer, Phenyle, Soap oil, Pain balm, Moisturising cream, Ayurvedic powder, Determination of Ammonia in water samples, Physicochemical Analysis of water samples, Preparation of Auditing and Vermi-composting are the major areas for consultancy.
- All Departments have conducted Extension Programmes to the nearby village school students which helped the parents to achieve placement of their ward to higher education (promote gross enrolment ratio)
- Under Cross Cultural Programme various competitions like drawing, essay writing in Tamil, English etc were conducted by the Departments through Departmental clubs.
- More than 2000 Units of Blood have been donated for the persons in medical exigency during the last five years. Rare Blood group students (Rh Negative) are always kept ready for any emergency blood transfusion. Blood Donor Cell has the inventory.
- Special camps, One day camps, Medical/Health Check-ups, awareness rallies and saplings plantation were organised by NSS, YRC and RRC.
- Appreciation Awards for extension activities were received from Government Rajaji Hospital for Blood Donation..
- Best performance Award in YRC was given to College.
- Free Tuition to rural school students organised through NSS Units of Our College gives the platform for developing the teaching skill for volunteers and learning skill for beneficiaries.
- To enhance the entrepreneurship skill and emphasize the importance of cleanliness among the students, the students have prepared phenyl, soap oil, pain balm, natural fertilizer, herbal powder and moisturizing cream.

- Awareness rallies on Dengue fever, rain water harvesting, Anti-drug addiction, judicious use and control of plastics, Swachh Bharath Abhyan, form the part of Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR).
- The college has linkages with Best- Training and Placement Institutes.
- The college has linkages with most of the educational institutions for exchanging teachersas resource persons and exchange of students for knowledge acquiring/conferences/workshops.
- ↑ The college has signed MoUs with Educational institution, Career Academies and Training Centres for the purpose of acquiring and promoting skills in inculcating life values.
- Internal feedback from students and faculty members are collected to ensure effective implementation of the programme.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- The college campus is spread over an area of 43 acres of land with the built up area of 1,38,320sq.mts.
- All the class rooms and staff rooms are equipped with adequate furniture and laboratories with essential equipments in all the departments.
- A spacious air—conditioned laboratory with inbuilt high power generators functions in the Computer Centre.

- 100 computers are available in the college for general computer education.
- ◆ After the accreditation (Cycle II), the built up area was added with 8000 sq.mts.

- ◆ Constant supply of safe drinking water is ensured. 2 RO plants capacity of 500 LPH and 250 LPH are available.
- Audio-visual equipment LED-TV and DVD player are available for students" recreation in the Departments.
- 24x7 hours security with the help of CCTV Cameras with 3 tier (8 hours manpower roster) system.
- There is a provision for 24 X 7 uninterrupted power supplies with high power generators.
- Indoor games namely Carom, Chess and Table tennis are available.
- Ramps are constructed in all the buildings for the benefit of the physically challenged public/students.
- The library has the physical facilities namely Reading room, Reference Section, Stack room, Reprographic facility, e- library facility and e-gate for attendance.

- A list of new acquisitions is provided to the departments from time to time.
- Book Bank facility (Departmental and Central Library) is provided to the students.
- New books are displayed on a separate shelf in the library.
- The college has a Library Advisory Committee to assess the functions and offer suggestions for the procurement, optimal utilisation and development of library resources.
- Every year, the library obtains feedback from the users through the feedback forms.

 User's requirements are ascertained and are analysed by the IQAC and are then

- forwarded to the Library Advisory Committee. The suggestions are incorporated in consultation for implementation.
- The faculty members, M.Phil., scholars and students have access to e-resources.
- All the Departments are provided with Desktop or Laptop, Printer and internet connectivity with Wi-Fi Modem for Official Communications from the Office Regarding examination, emergency notices, deputation of staff/students for programmes, preparing e-learning, e-teaching and allied academic, research participation, preparations and presentations.
- ◆ The college has a common seminar hall, where ICT based "online teaching" resources are provided. Use of smart classrooms, LCD projectors, independent learning, net based assignments, and e-journals make the teacher an effective facilitator.
- At the end of each semester, a consolidated report is submitted to the Secretary/Administrator of the college for the maintenance work to be carried out during vacation.
- The Secretary and Administrator of the college take care of maintenance of buildings, class rooms and laboratories with two resident service work wings (24x7) namely Construction Engineering Wing and Carpentry, Electrical cum Plumbing Wing.
- Periodic instructions, reviews, checks, observations by the stakeholders and continuous monitoring by the higher authorities help in all-round up-keep and maintenance of infrastructure.
- Maintenance of computers, printers, software hardware and internet connectivity is done through central IT department through Annual Maintenance Contract outsourcing (AMC).

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- The college has an integrated system for student support and mentoring.
- ◆ The institution provides financial aid through Students Aid Fund to the economically backward students.
- The management provides following supports namely: a) Free Education, b) Free Education under Sports Quota, c) Half-Fee Concession for academics,
- Apart from the Central and State Government, Merit/welfare Scholarships, there are other forums too offering monetary benefits to the needy students.

- Entrepreneurial Skill Development Programmes and Personality Development Programmes are given to the students.
- Motivation of the students towards "Earn-While-You-Learn" is in practice
- Add on courses such as Typewriting, Tally, Computer literacy courses are organized to equip the students for their career opportunities.
- Coaching classes for bank examinations, TNPSC, UPSC and Allied Services, and Other Competitive Exams conducted.
- NET/SET Free coaching classes are conducted to the PG,M.Philand Ph.D., students
- News papers namely The New Indian Express, Dhinamalar, Dhinamani and the Hindu are provided at the reading room of the Department of Economics and the General Library.
- Certificate Courses on Spoken Hindi, Spoken Sanskrit, are conducted for all the students to learn and speak in Hindi and Sanskrit.
- Students are deputed to various institutions to participate in activities/events namely Workshops, Seminars, Conferences and Competitions (ad-mad, poster preparation, paper presentation, debate, and quiz).
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell helps the students to identify job opportunities and prepare themselves for interview by organizing guest lectures, workshops, off-campus drives, coaching classes and mock interviews. 16 such programmes were conducted.
- 47students were placed in various companies through on campus and off campus interviews during the last five years.
- ◆ The College has an Alumni Association. Every year members meet and discuss the future prospects and the welfare programmes to be implemented for the benefit of the existing students.
- Alumni Association renders convocation day arrangements and provides files and pens to the students who are to receive the degrees.
- The college has a student Grievance Redressal Cell and an Anti-Ragging Committee.
- Economically weak/deserving students are provided with 50 to 100% fee concession on request to the management, forwarded by the Principal/HOD.
- The progression of the students is regularly monitored by the Class Counselor, HOD and the Principal through the records.

- Arranging scholarships from Government and other efforts taken by the college reduce the dropout rate and increase the pass percentage of the students.
- Annual Sports Day is organized by sports committee under the guidance of Director of Physical Education (DPE). ALL the students participate in sports activities. A unique feature of our college is massive student participation.
- Feedback collected from the students is analysed and used for planning and developing support services.
- Timely arrangements for State Government Bus pass and Railway concession season tickets are provided to day scholars.
- ◆ The college has a Students Council to look after the problems and prospects of the students and recommends to the Principal / HODs.
- Students from UG Science, Arts, Commerce and PG represent on academic and administrative bodies of the college namely Library Advisory Committee, Sports Committee, Appeal & Grievance Redress Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee, Student's Welfare Committee, Women Cell and Examination Committee.
- One student representative serves as the members of the IQAC
- College Annual Magazine is an additional niche to the students to express themselves through creative writing, drawing and also to share social and scientific information.
- Selected articles are published in the Annual Research Journal SALSEARCH
 Published by the College every year.
- Different associations/forums established at the Department level conduct programmes namely Seminars, Workshops, Conferences, Guest Lectures and Symposia, Cultural Competition etc.,
- Students are encouraged to publish their papers in the proceedings of seminars / workshops / conferences / symposia, organized by our college and other institutions.
- Uniform is given to all the players at free of cost to enhance the team spirit, boost the enthusiasm and exhibit unique identity.
- The management provides waiver in course fee for the University/ Zonal/ State/ National players.
- Special achievers are felicitated in General meetings, Annual Day and in Sports Day Celebrations.
- The individual champions of the intramural matches are awarded appropriately.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

- The Principal and two senior faculty members are the members of the Management Committee. They reflect the need of the faculty and students and allied planning, funding and execution.
- There is a functional decentralization by establishing IQAC with Coordinator, Vice-Principal, COE-ACOE, HODs and Office Superintendent.
- They function according to the collective decisions of the Management Committee.

 Thus, the decentralization ensures democracy and transparency in all activities.
- Through Parents-Students-Teachers Colloquium (PSTC) the parents interact with the Class teacher, Staff members, HOD and Principal on issues pertaining to academics. Parents/guardians have free access to meet and share their suggestions with the Principal and the teachers.
- Periodical Staff Meetings and HODs Council Meeting serve as a forum to convey their feedback. Most of the decisions are taken after consultation with the staff during the staff meetings.
- Alumni interact with the college through face book, website, phone contacts and during the Alumni Association Meeting and provide financial aid to the needy students.
- Their opinions and suggestions are considered for the development of institution.
- The college interacts with the Industrialists during their academic visit to the college and during campus interviews, regarding the skills to be provided/promoted to the students for employability.
- IQAC carries out analysis on matters related to the institution and its functioning.

 Annual reports by departments, associations and suggestions of stakeholders are useful for making policies, planning and execution.
- IQAC monitors and evaluates the college policies and plans through the Heads meeting, staff meeting (TS & NTS), association meetings, committee meetings and periodical reviews.
- The staff members are given responsibilities as IQAC Coordinator, VicePrincipal,
 COE-ACOE, HODs, Coordinator of Seminars, Convenor of various Committees,

- Programme Officers for NSS (7 Units), YRC, RRC, NCC and various Skill Development Programmes.
- All decisions pertaining to Academics, Student Affairs and faculty are considered with the respective committees of the college.
- Governance and infrastructure are monitored by selfless and dedicated monastic people.
- Employees Provident Fund scheme (EPF), ESI Scheme, medical / maternity leave, leave for completion of research, personal loans and festival advance are the welfare measures provided to the Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff.
- Staff Association is run by the teaching and non-teaching staff. The teaching and non-teaching members are honoured with a gift as a mark of love, respect and complement on the occasion of 20 years completion of service. In case of mishap to a colleague, a team of staff visit and pay homage.
- The Management committee is the apex body to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources.
- The funds are optimally used and standardized auditing procedures are adopted to scrutinize the utilization of the same.
- The college accounts are subject to external audit. The external Audit is done annually by a Chartered Accountant.
- Academic audit through external experts for all the Departments are conducted (with defined Syllabi, lesson plan, CIA questions and Model Examinations questions)
 Suitable guidance and support for website updation.
- The external members of the IQAC include one each from the field of education, industry and one alumnus, apart from eight members from different faculties.

CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

- **◆** The college conducts green audit.
- Energy consuming tube lights and sodium lamps are gradually replaced by energy saving CFL.
- Replacements of spoiled computer monitors with LCD Monitors reduce electricity consumption and level of radiation.
- Rain water harvesting is available in all buildings. The rain water collected from other areas is channelized to the pond in the college.

- Students are suggested not to use their own vehicle to the college. Students from nearby areas are advised to take a walk or to come by bicycle. The vehicle users are instructed to park the vehicles at the entrance to sustain the pollution-free environment.
- The college instructs the staff and students to avoid incineration of any material to the extent possible.
- The Eco club and NSS volunteers have planted saplings in and around the college campus and also maintain them.
- Paper cups and plates are used in canteen. Red bins are placed to dispose hazardous wastes and green bins are kept for decomposable wastes.
- The expired chemicals and glass wares are buried in the remote area of the campus. Use of re-writable CDs and USBs.
- Reuse of computer related peripherals for decorative purpose (wall hangings, pen stand, flower vase etc.) as departmental activities. (Art from waste programme) are practiced.



The College Colours are White, Blue and Yellow, symbolizing Purity, Love and Sacrifice, respectively.





The Madura College (Autonomous) takes every opportunity to make the best use of 'autonomy' to pursue innovation in curriculum design right from 1978 the year of conferment of autonomy to till date.

The following Mechanism is used to design and develop the curriculum 3

Stage 1:

- Emerging areas/global demand/thrust areas are identified through academic platforms like orientation, refresher courses, seminars and workshops.
- > UGC Model Curriculum is used as reference material
- Feedback of faculty, students, alumnae and parents is considered to evaluate the utility content of the curriculum
- Expert opinion is taken from university professors, BOS members, external Examiners, IQAC, Principal, Management Members of Management and Industrialists
- > The curricula of premier educational institutions are studied
- ➤ Recruiters and the college placement cell suggest on employability elements to be included in curriculum
- ➤ The recommendations/ the minutes of the previous BOS meetings form the basis for curriculum design and development
- Cost Benefit Analysis is done before starting a new course

Then curriculum is developed by describing the learning goals and outcomes of the academic programmes. This involves showing how the program of study fits together and how it is designed to help the student achieve the program goals.

Stage 2:

The curriculum is consolidated after the individual departments carry a discussion on the feasibility and viability of the curriculum, among their faculty.

Stage 3:

The curriculum is designed in consultation with the Boards of Studies which comprises a University Nominee, Subject Experts, an Industrialist, an Alumnus and Faculty.

Stage 4:

The approved syllabus is placed before the Academic Council for ratification. The Council has discretionary powers to give its recommendations/modifications.

Stage 5:

The ratified syllabus is placed before the Governing Body for final adoption.

While restructuring the curriculum all departments refer to national and internationalmodels of their respective subjects. All the departments follow the guidelines of UGC, Madurai Kamaraj University and TANSCHE (Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education).

1.1.3 How does the College involve industry, research bodies and civil society in the curriculum design and development process?

Industry:

The College has maintained a robust industry - academia interface to bridge the gap between the two to make the curriculum industry relevant. Industrialists are involved in the four out of five stages of curriculum design.

The college follows the practice of having a industrialists as member of the Board of Studies and their suggestions considered in framing the syllabus help us meet the requirements of the industry. The Academic Council (the final authority for approving the

syllabi) also includes an industrialist as an external expert. Their opinion during the conduct of Academic Council are given due weightage in the syllabus restructuring.

Research Bodies:

The Departments invite scientists / researchers / academicians from premier research institutions for seminars and conferences. By way of interaction with them, emerging areas, recent trends and global needs are identified for making suitable modifications in the curriculum. Several alumnus of our College are employed in research institutions like DRDO (Defence and Research Development Organization), NPL (National Physical Laboratory), IIT (Indian Institute of Technology) etc., and they help in the curriculum designing.

Civil Society:

The Rectors day and the College day celebrations have a fair representation of eminent people from various walks of life. Further, on the eve of fests and exhibitions the opinion of eminent guests is solicited. Feedback is also obtained from alumni/parents and relevant suggestions are incorporated in the curriculum. By involving these stakeholders in the curriculum design, the college ensures that the curriculum developed incorporates components for employability, research, emerging trends and social relevance. As a result, the curriculum is made effective. It offers scope for in-depth knowledge and equips the learner to compete with success at the vertical and horizontal levels.

1.1.4 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development? Employability, Innovation and Research.

Employability

Employability is marked as the chief outcome of all the courses planned. With the advent of autonomy, new courses with high job potential like B.Sc., (Biotechnology), B.Sc., (Information Technology), B.Com., (Professional Accounting) and MSc., (Microbiology) were introduced. At the same time, the curriculum of the existing U.G. and P.G. programmes are revised to promote employability.

- For instance, the revised General English curriculum lays emphasis on employability skills viz., resume building, presentation skills, group discussion skills, interview skills etc.,
- ➤ Interdisciplinary papers Renewable energy sources , Physics of everyday life and Economics for Competitive Examinations
- Computer paper for all UG students.
- Field visits & Herbarium collection are mandatory components in the curriculum of Botany
- Placement Cell organises mock interviews, resume workshops, aptitude tests.

Innovation

- Projects at P.G. level and in some U.G. courses
- > Field visits / survey and Industrial Visit
- Visit to orphanage for sociology students
- Industrial training through reputed companies like TVS for commerce students.
- Language labs to promote spoken English.

Research

- Research aspect is ensured in curriculum design and development mainly through project work/internships. Project is made for all the PG students in the final year to inculcate research aptitude. Each final year student at the PG level takes up a project in the final semester valued for 100 marks and graded.
- ➤ Guest lectures on research methodologies impart knowledge on project guidelines and selection of topics in emerging areas.
- In-house research supervisors constantly monitor the students' projects.
- Paper on statistical applications is part of the curriculum in some P.G. courses
- > The students and staff are encouraged to present papers at Regional/National seminars.
- > Students are encouraged to do research on topics given as assignments by guides and make use of library and internet.
- Mini Projects, Case studies, Field visits etc. to inculcate Research aptitude in students.

1.1.5 Curriculum development and its relevance on the regional / national developmental needs

Taking into account the economic background of students especially from rural and urban socially and economically weaker section of the society, the curricular programs are planned and prepared in a lucid and simple way. This enables us to sensitize the minds of the students and kindle interest in the field higher education.

ICT based subjects are mandatory in almost all the courses either in the form of skill based or major elective subjects to make the students to face the competitive situations. As the course progresses, advanced and contemporary subjects are included in the curriculum.

To impart values among the students, the value education and environmental studies are made compulsory, during the first year. The curriculum is planned and prepared in such a way to make the students responsible citizens before and after the completion of the degree programme.

1.1.6 Curricular development and the guidelines of regulatory bodies

The curriculum is developed as per the guidelines of the University Grants Commission, New Delhi, Tamilnadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE) and Madurai Kamaraj University. TANSCHE has made CBCS pattern compulsory which is also followed by the college. Our academic challenges go beyond the class rooms through extension programmes through special training programmes to the needy people in and around the college areas.

1.2 ACADEMIC FLEXIBILITY

1.2.1Details on the provisions with reference to academic flexibility

(a) Core / Elective options:

The UG students are offered by their respective departments, Elective subjects in the 5th and 6th semesters. Elective papers are offered to the students based on the interaction made by the HOD and the faculty. Similarly, for PG students, elective papers are offered in the 3rd and 4th semesters.

The institution is providing academic flexibility to students to move from one discipline to the other at U.G level in NME (Non Major Elective) and atP.G level in interdisciplinary elective subjects. This provides them horizontal mobility toselect inter disciplinary subjects of their choice. The curriculum is restructured periodically and Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is introduced to the students to ensure academic flexibility. The list of Non Major Elective papers are

(b) Enrichment courses

The College initiates supplementary enriched programmes in the form Career Oriented Programmes included in the regular curriculum in the form of Skill Based Elective. The Dept. of Chemistry has entered into Cluster College System, wherein the department along with Chemistry Department of ANJA College and LDC of Madurai train students for CSIR/UGC/NET examinations. Majority of the students hail from poor background unable to pay the minimal fee fixed by the college for these courses. However, the college offered many certificate courses earlier.

The students are admitted to the self-financing courses by following the norms framed by the Government of Tamilnadu.

The fee structure of self-financing programme is slightly higher than that of aided programme, as the college has to meet the expenditure incurred for the salary of self-financing staff.

Teachers qualified with M.Phil. / Ph.D. and SET / NET are always given priority for appointment. Teacher Salary has been fixed based on their performance and experience.

1.2.5 Has the College adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)? If yes, how many programmes are covered under the system?

Yes. The college has adopted the **Choice Based Credit System** for **all** UG and PG Programmes. The Tamil Nadu State Council for Higher Education (TANSCHE) has recommended a uniform credit structure for all U.G. and P.G. programmes offered in all universities and autonomous colleges in Tamil Nadu to facilitate student mobility across universities and colleges and make the quantum of study more or less the same across the Universities in Tamil Nadu. Based on this, the College has adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) in all U.G and P.G. programmes. All the U.G. and P.G. programmes are under semester system and research programs are obviously for a period of two years and one year for Ph.D., and M.Phil.,respectively. 1.1.4 What are the strategies adopted for revision of the existing programmes? What percentage of courses underwent a major syllabus revision?

The prime strategy adopted for revision of the existing programmes is to have periodic consultations with Expert committee and Board of Studies for their opinions/suggestions and recommendations. Further,

Students'-Feedback on Curriculum is obtained by the College from each student after the completion of the course, in a definite format every year.

Alumni: The Alumni Association of the College obtains feedback on curriculum from the alumni members during the meetings.

Parents: The College obtains feedback on curriculum from the Parents at the time of the parents-teachers meetings organized by each department.

Employers/Industries: Career and Counselling Cell organises seminars, counsellingprogrammes with different companies and job-oriented peer groups who give feedback on the curriculum.

Academic peers: The College obtains feedback on curriculum from those who visit the College from time to time for Boards of Studies, Academic Council and Conferences/Seminars.

Community: The Institution takes part in different community programmes and social services through its NSS Unit, NCC Units. Here the students and teachers interact directly with different members in the community where they get feedback on the curriculum.

1.4 FEEDBACK

1.4.1 Does the College have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

Yes. The college has a well structured mechanism to obtain feedback from students

The exit level feedback assesses whether expectations of the students have been successfully met Their feedback on relevance/utility of the course is considered. Informal feedback from students is also obtained during counseling sessions. The Feedback from students is analysed in the departmental meetings, HODs meeting, BOS meetings and changes are incorporated as per the need in the academic review of the curriculum. The feedback is used by the management to enhance the 'Distinct environment' of excellence in education by ensuring operational corrections/remedial practices. It is predominantly used to enhance the learning methodologies, standardization of curricula, evaluation and teaching learning practices.

1.4.2 Feedback from National and International Faculty

The frequent visits and exposure of the faculty and students from institutions of higher education in India and abroad ensures that curriculum changes in the College.

The college **invites** eminent national resource persons to engage in group discussions and train faculty on ways and means to update the curriculum to suit the current trends.

1.4.3 Feedback from Alumni, Employers, Industry Experts and Community

Feedback from alumni is gathered at alumni meets. An alumnus being a member of the BOS plays an influential role in curriculum enrichment through their valuable opinions on the utility of the course.

An expert representing the industry is invited to serve on the Academic Council. Their constructive criticisms and suggestions help departments in modifying courses.



TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The ingrained reputation earned by the college over the period of 126 years through its commitment to the poor and downtrodden and at the same time the quality of academic input offered by the college, it attracts applicants from diverse backgrounds.

Publicity

The Admission process is widely publicized to the community:

- by advertising in Tamil and EnglishNewspaper
- by placing a banner at the College entrance
- on the College website http://maduracollege.org.
- by publishing Prospectus indicating the programmes offered and the eligibility criteria every year.

Transparency in Admission Process

The college is known for its transparency in the admission procedure

Stage I

A committee nominated by the Principal on the basis of guidelines prescribed by the Government of Tamilnaduprepares the prospectus and the application forms. The prospectus includes the curricular highlights, employment opportunities, student support services and departmental updates.

State II

Undergraduate Programmes

After ten days from the declaration of higher secondary results, the filled in forms can be submitted for registration in the college.

The data from the application is used to prepare the consolidated database to generate the computerised rank list. This has been a practice in the college for more than a decade.

On the norms and guidelines prescribed by the Government of Tamil Nadu, Provisional selection list Candidates is prepared and informed of their provisional selection by snail mails sent under certificate of posting. The selection list is also made available for public viewat the College Library and Notice Board.

The innovative method introduced in Admission from 2011 is the counseling system. This counseling system has made the process of admission much simpler, transparent and quicker. The counselling cut-off marks are decided well in advance by the committee with the consultation of HODs of the concerned Departments and the students are informed about the counselling, when they submit their applications. The general procedure is, for UG courses the Higher secondary marks out of 800 is considered. The candidates in the respective

mark range satisfying the eligibility criteria report for counseling and choose the subject they wish to study and get admitted.

Subsequently the date of admission, all original documents are verified and the candidate is admitted after payment of fees.

Based on the number of vacancies after admission, subsequent provisional selection lists are prepared.

PG admission

As per the State Government norms, marks obtained in Part – III subjects upto fifth semester are considered for preparing merit lists. The rank list prepared as per the norms issued by the Govt. of Tamilnadu by the individual departments should be approved by the admission committee wherein the Principal is the Chairman.

Selected candidates are informed by Post sent through Certificate of Posting and the admission procedure follows as above in the case of U.G. courses.

M.Phil.,& Ph.D.

Percentage of marks in the PG programme and Personal interview are considered for admission in to M.Phil. Programme.

For the Ph.D., programme, UGC and Madurai Kamaraj University guidelines are adhered to.

2.1.2 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

Yes. The Admissions Committee annually reviews its admission process and the studentprofiles

Analysis:

Review of the admission process and the record of the students' profile help in providing equal representation from all sections of the society. The success of the review mechanism is evidenced by the ever increasing demand for admissions over the past four years.

2.1.3 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access to students belonging to the following categories.

The College follows reservation policy for admissions of the socially, economically disadvantaged sections, physically challenged persons, sports persons and children of exservicemen.

SC/ST/OBC: Statutory reservation policies of the government are followed. Fee

Concessions and scholarships are offered. All the facilities in the form of various coaching programmes sponsored by the Government are promptly offered to them. The cut-off marks are relaxed

Women: As part of the strategy adopted to create equity, the college reserves 33% of the sanctioned seats for women students in both UG & PG courses. Separate Cut-off percentage is fixed. Women empowerment cell on thecampus empowers girls through various awareness programmes.

Different categories of persons with disabilities: The College is accommodativetowards candidates applying in this category. Cut off percentage is relaxed forthem. These students are also counseled on the viable course options available forthem. Once admitted, the campus being disabled friendly offers special amenities like scribe writers for blind etc. **Economically weaker sections**: Economically backward students having therequired percentage of marks and attendance are given financial assistance through some sponsoring agencies. The college extends to the students an opportunity to pay fees in installments.

Outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities: Seats are reserved for students who have distinguished themselves in NCC, NSS, sports and other extracurricular activities.

2.1.5 Necessary Measures to Cope with Increased Demand

The college has conducted analysis of demand for the various programmes offered. This shows an increase in demand for all theUndergraduate and some Postgraduate programmes. The increased demand was duly informed to the Madurai Kamaraj University which in turn has sanctioned an increase in seats of twenty percent for Laboratory Sciences and twenty-five percent for non-Laboratory courses.

Yes. B.Sc., (E &C) Course in the Self finance scheme was discontinued in the year 2014 – 2015 because of poor demand. However B.Sc.,(Physics) was resumed from the same year due to its demand.

2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements ofstudent population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement ofclasses? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Yes. The college has a mechanism through which the differential requirements of student population are analysed soon after admission from student application which include details like academic, socio-economic background, special talents, and abilities of the students. Personal interaction during the orientation programme also helps the college to identify the strength and weaknesses of a student. Based on the findings, due care is taken to decide the course content.

2.2.3. How does the institution cater to the needs of disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, differently-abled students and and slow learners etc., to ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Steps and measures are taken to arrange for scholarships for disadvantaged sections and economically disadvantaged sections. UGC sponsored training programmes, remedial coaching classes are arranged with due care adhering the norms of the government.

The differently-abled students are given quota in their admission into UG and PG courses following the Tamilnadu government's rule. The category includes visually challenged and physically challenged. The principal appoints scribes to help the visually challenged students to write their examinations. Bilingual explanations are given whenever it is necessary. Counseling and mentoring sessions are conducted in a friendly way to help the students to overcome their psychological problems and achieve their goals successfully.

2.2.4 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

The advanced learners are identified by the concerned faculty based on their performance in internal assessment tests, end-semester examination, Student-teacher interaction and active participation, involvement, performance in the classroom/academic clubs/ seminars, etc.

Students are given opportunity to take part in the research carried out by the faculty in the department.

Students are motivated to appear for national level examinations conducted by different agencies.

Students are encouraged to participate in the inter-college level competitions

Students are appointed as club leaders which gives the scope for learning social / event Managerial Skills.

2.3 TEACHING-LEARNING PROCESSG-LEARNING PROCESS

2.3.1 How does the College Plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc).

At the end of every academic year, the principal and calendar committee plan the academic calendar for the next academic year. The academic calendar highlights the plan of academic events during the year. The academic calendar consists of the details regarding the

schedule of payment of fees, examination dates and other important events of the college. The dates for various events presented in the calendar are generally adhered to.

Department wise timetables prepared well in advance are also displayed on the notice boards for the students. The calendar is made available to each student and faculty at the beginning of the academic year. Each department has a well defined semester planner, monthly planner, and individual unit planners to ensure smooth functioning of the semester.

2.3.2. Does the college provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

The students receive the syllabus for all the subjects for each semester from the course teacher. The following are mentioned is the syllabus

- i) Course Pattern
- ii) Course Code
- iii) Duration
- iv) Maximum Marks
- v) The detailed syllabus of the respective Course
- vi) Distribution of Credits to each paper

In order to make the learning process effective the prior knowledge of the course plan and the teaching schedules are noted by the students.

2.3.3. Which are the courses following predominantly the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

Lecture methods too are made more participatory with student seminars, focused group discussions, problem solving sessions, debates, film/book, reviews, quiz and oral presentations by students.

The college has been extensively using technology in teaching but not in total exclusion of lecture method, realizing the critical importance of human contact in the lecture method which provides a nurturing environment for effective learning. In addition to classroom interactions, following are the other methods of learning experiences provided to the students:

- Seminars/ workshops /guest lectures
- Presentations
- Assignments
- Project work
- Field work
- Use of audio-visual aids
- Use of e-resources

2.3.4. How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty.

Student centered methods are an integral part of the pedagogy adopted by the faculty. The institution has made a conscious effort to shift from the traditional teacher –centric approach to a student-centric one.

In Science, Experiential learning, participative learning, and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences. The following student-centric programmes are practiced in the college

Individualized activities: Internship/Project Work, Mini-projects, Seminars, student presentations, paper presentations, etc.

Group activities: Group Projects, Paper presentations etc.,

Academic clubs of the departments organize activities to facilitate the creativeacademic pursuits of the students individually and collectively. Academic clubsalso promote collaborative learning, team spirit and organization skills.

Book reviews promote critical and evaluative skills among students. Inculcation of book reading habits makes the student a lifelong learner.

Free access to the internet and DELNET (e-journals) make them self-reliant and independent learners.

2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts/people of eminence to provide lectures/seminars for students?

Every department on an average conducts four / five guest lecturers each year. Abudget is earmarked for the same. State level/National seminars are conducted by inviting eminent resource persons from reputed National& International institutes/industries/researchbodies/social circles.

2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The following are the technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching:

- All departments are well equipped with ICT-enabled facilities for teaching-like computers, OHPs, LCD projectors, internet facility
- English Language Lab is equipped with DVD players, computers and interactive CDs that are used for the screening of documentaries and information visuals setup with an aim of equipping the learners of English with a good command of the language for communication purposes.
- E-Library resources and online content are used by teachers where the courses need updated information.
- Workshops and seminars are held by the college and the faculty is also encouraged to attend seminars and conferences.
- > Screening documentaries and feature films

- Faculty uses e-learning resources like National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) Videos/pdf and open e-learning resources like Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) etc.
- 2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors / mentors/ advisors for each classor group of students for academic, personal and psycho- socio guidance? If yes, givedetails of the process and the number of students who have benefited.

Yes, there is a provision for the services of counsellor / mentors.

For every class in a department a faculty member acts as a mentor and he/she monitors the academic and personal issues of the students of that particular class. The Psycho-social needs of the student community are specifically addressed by trainedcounsellors. Counseling is offered on an individual basis to help students with personal concerns that interfere with academic performance and emotional well being. Students from rural background are motivated to boost their confidence levels and be part of the main stream. In addition, integrated development of the students is also ensured by value-education classes

2.3.8 How does the college create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

To promote scientific temperament among students the college has made project work an integral part of the curriculum. In few science subjects the students are encouraged to make live models. Added to this students are engaged in lab to land (Extension) programme wherein they exhibit/demonstrate concepts of science to students from neighbouring schools. College strives to instill and nurture creativity and scientific temper among the learners through providing opportunities in the following areas:

- > Field work
- Interaction with scientists, eminent academicians
- > Seminars
- Creative Assignments
- Research paper presentation at the Regional / National level
- Academic Club Activities

2.3.9 Does the college consider student projects a mandatory part of the learning programme? If so, for how many programs it is mandatory?

The college considers student projects as an essential part of the learning programme. It is mandatory course requirement for a few PG programmes. Mini projects are also made a part of laboratory programme in Physics.

2.3.10 Does the college have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students/ alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching –learning process?

Yes, the institution has a structured feedback system for evaluation of teachers. Thefeedback is well structured and the questionnaire is comprehensively formulated toevaluate the teacher and the course pattern on various aspects.

Feedback is also taken from the final year students on their exit and also from the alumni at alumni meets. The feedback is consolidated and analyzed in terms of the strengths and weaknesses of the teacher. Informal feedback is also received through interaction with students by the Headof the Department and Institution and also by The Management. Feedback process is handled with confidentiality and sensitivity. The feedback is analyzed by the Head of the Institution and discussed with HOD. HOD will informally interact with the faculty and whenever needed, suggestions are given for improvement.

2.3.11 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The college has a well stacked general library and departmental libraries that cater to the needs of the teachers to take books for reference

The library manages to cater to the needs of teachers and students with access tobooks, magazines, journals and e-journals. CDs are also available

Multiple copies of necessary text books in all disciplines are available. The booksfrom the Department libraries and General Library are issued to the students.

A separate section in the library houses projects for reference purpose. Students are allowed to retain books for exams.

Every publisher/seller organise Book exhibitions on campus (in the departments) to facilitate Faculty members to select the books of their choice which is needed for teaching.

To provide effective utilization Library is open to all students and members of the staff on all working days except on Sundays and Government Holidays.

2.4 TEACHER QUALITY

2.4.1 What is the faculty strength of the College? How many positions are filled against the sanctioned strength?

The college has well qualified, adequate faculty. The institution ensures that the teaching

positions against the sanctioned posts are filled in reasonable time.

All the applications are screened and the short listed eligible candidates are informed to attend interview along with the original certificates.

The short listed eligible candidates are interviewed by selection committeecomprising two subject experts nominated by Madurai Kamaraj University, HOD of the department, Principal, SC/ST representative, Syndicate Member, Member from Management and other members recommended by the University from time to time.

2.5 EVALUATION PROCESS AND REFROMS

2.5.1 How does the College ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation Processes that are operative?

The college presently practicing the evaluation system suggested by TANSCHE, while implementing CBCS first time in the college.

The Institution disseminates the evaluation processes to all its stakeholders in the following ways:

Admission process and Prospectus

Presentations given on the orientation day by the Principal, the Controller of examinations and the respective HODs.

Details of the examination systems, components of evaluation are printed in the college handbook, issued to each student and in the beginning of the academic year.

Regular class room instructions by the faculty notices to students.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the College and to what extent have they been implemented in the College? Cite a few examples which havepositively impacted the evaluation management system?

Being an autonomous institution, the college periodically carries out evaluation reforms and some of the reforms implemented successfully are:

Three continuous assessment tests are conducted and the average of best two marks are added with Assignment / Quiz / Seminar and accounted as Continuous Internal Assessment mark.

Students are issued with valued Internal Test Answer Sheets and their signature accepting the evaluation is obtained. In case of any discrepancy, they can bring it to the knowledge of the course teacher and it will be rectified.

For semester external examination, questions are set by an examiner chosen from the panel prepared by the concerned Head of the Department.

For semester external examination double valuation is done by both internal and external examiners for both UG and PG.

An unique system of board meeting of internal and external examiners is conducted to consolidate the marks after evaluation and to review the evaluation in case of discrepancy. Recently, the college practice a new system of evaluation in which if the difference in marks between internal and external evaluation is more than 10%, the paper will be sent for third valuation and the average of best two marks is awarded.

After the approval by the Awards Committee, the results are published in the college notice board and a copy is sent to the respective department.

Regarding the external evaluation, after the publication of results, the students can apply for revaluation.

Recently, the academic council of the college empowered the Controller of Examination to employ moderation process in case, if a student fails by a need of two mark to get a pass, when internal and external marks put together with external passing minimum.

Supplementary Examination is conducted during even semester. All the above reforms have positive impact on the system.

Positive Impact

The Board meeting system gives a room for revaluation of the paper both by internal and external examiners, one more time in case the difference in mark of their evaluation, is less than 10%.

Continuous internal assessments give the teacher a scope to periodically monitor the academic performance of the student and accordingly identify suitable/timely strategies for improvement.

The recently introduced third valuation gives a fair justice to the student as the paper is evaluated by one more expert.

2.5.3 What measures have been taken by the institution for continuous evaluation of students and ensuring their progress and improved performance?

The continuous internal assessment of students has been a major introduction that revolutionalized the teaching – learning & evaluation process making it more flexible andprogressive.

Continuous evaluation of students is done throughout the semester by conducting three internal assessment tests and a skill based test which comprises assignments, presentations/seminars, quiz etc., in addition to practical examinations, project work and viva-voce.

The continuous assessment enables the teacher to monitor the student performance Internal answer sheets are given to the students to understand the nature of mistakes committed. This gives the teacher the scope to discuss the paper with the student and give suggestions for improvement.

2.5.4 What percentage of marks is earmarked for continuous internal assessment? Indicate the mechanisms strategized to ensure rigor of the internal assessment process?

25% is allotted for Continuous Internal Assessment.

The Continuous Internal assessment (CIA) evaluation pattern for PG

Every Department follows their own system of allocation of percentage of marks to different components approved by their Board of Studies and subsequently in the Academic council.

Mechanisms strategized to ensure rigour of CIA:

Internal evaluation pattern is evolved by the Board of Studies concerned and approved by the Academic Council.

Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) tests are conducted as per the schedule prepared by the college and discussed in the council meeting.

- The internal assessment time tables are displayed on the notice board wellin advance.
- Internal assessment tests are well organized with seating arrangement/invigilators list planned well in advance.
- The answer scripts are valued and shown to the students.
- The marks obtained by students are recorded and the consolidated CIA marks are shown to the students for verification.
- The Head of the department counter signs the internal marks and sends it to the controller's office for the data entry.
- Internal practical exams for lab courses are scheduled and comprise several criteriasuch as record work, viva voce, programme execution, etc.

2.5.5 Does the college adhere to the declared examination schedules? If not, what measures have been taken to address the delay?

Declaration of Examination Schedules:

The exact date of commencement of examination for both semesters of an academic year is provided in the calendar itself. The schedule of examination is prepared by the Controller of Examination and copies of it are sent to the individual departments. Heads of Departments convene meeting of the departmental staff to discuss the various issues like overlapping of papers, holidays in between examinations etc., and once the timetable is finalized, the college adheres to the declared examination schedule strictly unless there is unforeseen holidays declared by the Government and under such circumstances, examinations are rescheduled.

2.5.6 What is the average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results? Indicate the mode / media adopted by the College for the publication of examination results e.g., website, SMS, email, etc.

The average time taken by the College for declaration of examination results is 30 daysfrom the date of last examination. The results are officially released by the Controller of Examinations. College is taking fullest effort to upload the result on the college website. Presently the results are displayed on the college notice board.

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following process?

Pre-examination processes

After the completion of admission process, major wise students list is generated and Register Number for each student is assigned.

In the beginning of each semester, the scheme of examination, the syllabus copy of the subject, model question paper are informed to the students.

Wherever possible Staff Members are directed to prepare and submit Question Banks.

Regarding the payment of examination fees, students are insisted to pay their fees within the stipulated time, for Odd and Even semesters respectively. Sufficient time for payment of fees is given. The details of examination fees, and the last date of payment without and with fine are displayed in the notice board. A printed chalan consisting all particulars are generated and given to all the students in which they can pay the fees through State Bank of Mysore (functioning within the campus).

Once the last date for the payment of examination fee is over, final list of students who have paid the fees and who are eligible to appear for the examination is prepared.

The Summative Examination Time Table is prepared by the controller of examinations and displayed in the college notice board, and a copy is also sent to all departments.

The question paper setting for Summative Examination is done by External Examiners. The documents such as blue print, model question paper, syllabus and study materials (if any) are sent to the external examiners for the purpose of question setting.

Question paper printing and making copies is done exclusively by the COE's Office.

Hall tickets are generated for the eligible candidates, ten days before the commencement of the Summative Examination, and they are issued to the students one week before the commencement of examination. The hall ticket contains name of the student, photograph, course of study, register number.

Preparatory Arrangements:

Teacher's duty schedule is prepared by Chief (3 in number) who have been nominated from the list of Associate Professors in the College on rotation by the Principal.

Examination schedule and attendance sheets for students are prepared in advance by the office of controller of examinations.

Seating arrangements for examinations are planned in advance, and executed as per plan.

The students are oriented towards examination procedure (i.e.) time of assembling, discipline to be maintained inside the examination hall, punishment for malpractice and the other related details.

The teachers are oriented towards examinations procedure by the Chief and the Principal, before the commencement of summative examination.

Examination process

Photocopies of all the question papers are made ready in sealed covers with subject code, title of the subject, date and session under the supervision of the Controller of Examinations. On the day of examination, one external examiner will acknowledge the opening of the question paper packets daily. Confidential handling of question paper is ensured by following this procedure.

Safe keeping of answer scripts.

Arrangement of halls for the valuation of answer scripts.

Examination material management, logistics.

Post examination process

Attendance Collection, OMR Based Exam Result, Auto Processing, Generic Result Processing and Certification.

Integrated Examination Platform:

The office of the Controller of examinations (COE) is in-charge of the entire examination process. The entire examination process of the college is computerized.

Post examination Process:

The college has been practicing door valuation for many years, recently introduced, centralized valuation of the answer scripts by the internal and external examiners for UG and PG.

Double valuation is under practice for all U.G., P.G. and M.Phil to enable flawless valuation process to benefit the students.

Board Meeting of internal and external examiners are conducted as per the established procedure recently.

Results regarding PASS/RE-APPEARANCE is released by the Controller of Examinations and displayed in the Student Notice Board.

Final Results with Mark statements are prepared and placed before the Awards Committee for final approval.

Issue of marks statement to the students.

2.5.8 Has the College introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The college is practicing rules of Madurai Kamaraj University as autonomy status does not empower to frame rules in the evaluation process of Ph.D.,. However, in order to maintain the standard and quality of the work, individual Guides of scholars are empowered to design their own methods of evaluation along with statutory requirement of awarding degree of Ph.D., by Madurai Kamaraj University.

2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved process and functioning of the examination division/section?

Proposal to streamline operations at the examination branch are given immediate considerations. Expanded space has been provided to the examination branch. A strong room with multiple locking system for question paper storage, facilities for printing and storing answer scripts are some provisions made to improve the functioning of the examination branch.

The key feature of examination system is the supremacy of Controller of Examinations and their team of examiners. HODs, Principal or Management can not offer directives in choice or modifications of examiners / question papers etc.

The Examination branch is provided with necessary clerical assistance and also a computer programmer. The office is fully computerized with modern software's for processing data to make the system precise and time efficient. The high speed networked digital photocopiers and printers enable us to generate our Nominal lists, Timetables, Question papers, Memos and other formats related to the conduct of examinations and publication of results. The marks memo contains hologram of the college and security features were improved to make it tamper proof.

Other facilities provided are:

One Cannon high end comprising scanner, Xerox and Printer One Additional Copier

Transparency, security of evaluation system and timely completion of the examination process is thus ensured by the Institution.

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

The Institution has an effective mechanism for redressal of grievances pertaining to examinations. All the Grievances related to evaluation are promptly addressed by the Controller of Examinations as per the stipulated norms. Specific committees undertake remedial steps if needed.

2.6. STUDENT PERFORMANCE AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

2.6.1 Does the College have clearly stated learning outcomes for its programmes? If yes, give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes. The graduate attributes of the institution are clearly defined and articulated. The learning outcomes/objectives are clearly stated for each course while course content is prepared and then it is passed through the Boards of Studies and Academic Council. Course content with the learning outcomes is spelt out in the classroom by the course teacher.

2.6.2 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The College has a set mechanism to monitor the student's learning outcomes throughout the semester by course teachers and class-in-charges. It is monitored and ensured in the following ways:

The student's participation in the class and the marks scored in CIA, end semester exams and assignments help to identify the problems of the students Result analysis is done after each semester

The faculty members are also encouraged to conduct surprise tests, oral tests. Bridge courses and remedial classes wherever necessary are conducted at the department level. Monitoring is done through student feedback which includes a component on the achievements of learning outcomes. Success in Competitive Exams, Placement record, and Feedback from alumni regarding their employment ensures the achievement of learning outcomes. The students are encouraged to attend inter-collegiate seminars and workshops to compare their learning outcomes with that of the others.

2.6.3 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student learning outcomes and use it for overcoming barriers of learning?

The examination branch furnishes the statistical data on the examination results which is analysed by course teachers and HoDs. The observations from the analysis are discussed in the departmental meetings after which suitable measures for improvement are planned and executed. On Alumni day, information regarding current educational and employment status of the alumni are obtained through a oral feed back by the respective head of the department.

3. RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

3.1 PROMOTION OF RESEARCH:

The teaching faculty are aware that any higher education cannot sustain without research as a part of the curriculum. They try their best to promote research in the respective departments by way of first motivating the M.Phil., PG as well as UG students for research in novel fields. This paves the way for many students to contribute to research and development activities in the future. In fact, many research students of various departments have settled in reputed organizations/Institutions after their doctoral work.

3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research centre/s of the affiliating university or any other agency/organization?

The Madura college has 6 research departments recognized by the host University (Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai) as follows;1. Tamil; 2. Philosophy; 3.Zoology; 4.Botany; 5.Physics; 6.Economics.Apart from these departments,Dept. of Chemistry, Dept. of Mathematics and Dept. of English pursue academic research in the college.

The college has a total of around 28 research supervisors including the above six departments and active research work is going on in these departments and other departments like depts. of Chemistry, Mathematics, and English. Our Institution has enormous research merits in the form of attracting funds from major funding agencies in India, publishing results of quality research in reputed International and National research Journals, publishing books, conducting various National level conferences etc. A total of 15 books have been published by the faculty members of the college. A total of 80 research students are working under the guidance of a total of 30 research guides. A total of 67 research students have completed Ph.D. from the Institution.

Activities of the Research Committee are to

- ① Identify training needs of researchers.
- Motivate researchers to take up Research Methodology workshops and short-term courses offered by the UGC-HRDC and other educational institutions.
- © Encourage faculty members to apply for M.Phil./Ph.D. guideship.
- © Encourage good research with prizes and endowments instituted for the purpose of promoting research.
- Assist the departments to apply for grants for the conduct of seminars and conferences.
- Encourage research output by way of presentation in seminars / conferences and publication in journals.
- Encourage sponsored research by motivating staff to apply for research projects from funding agencies.
- Recently a workshop on auditing was conducted by the internal auditors for staff on the auditing norms and principles for the maintenance of accounts for sponsored research projects encourage departments to apply for research centres.

3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

i. Autonomy to the Principal Investigator (PI)
 The PI is free to carry out whatever has been proposed and funded by the funding agencies.

ii. Timely Availability or Release of Resources? All physical infrastructure available in the college is available for use by the researcher. Wherever there is a demand for utilization of physical infrastructure, time slots are drawn and adhered to so that there is optimal utilization of resources. Monetary resource availability depends on the funding agencies, if it is involved.

iii. Adequate infrastructure and human resources?

The human resource is adequate and per the requirements stipulated by the norms of the UGC and the Govt. of Tamilnadu. There is adequate infrastructure as far as computational library facilities are concerned. The library subscribes to research journals. Books can be procured from research grants for research needs. The college has subscribed to INFLIBNET N-list facility for journals and e-books access. The Institution is trying to augment the infrastructure in several departments.

- iv. Time off, reduced teaching load, special leave, etc. for teachers?
 There are no such relaxations as per the norms of the Govt. of Tamilnadu. The researchers are treated as teachers of the Institution conforming to the norms of the directorate of collegiate education of the state. Research activities are carried out after the working hours and during non-contact working hours.
- v. Support in terms of technology and information needs?
 Basic computational facilities and internet connectivity are provided to all departments.
 Library access and Internet N-list access has been subscribed to by the institution.
- vi. Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate?

 Rigorous auditing is a routine procedure of the Institution, including physical checking of the items purchased by the PI's. A workshop in the auditing procedures and norms was conducted recently by the internal auditors of the institution.

3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The students are motivated towards science and research culture in each department, while interacting with students and also in the class room sessions. Particularly, the PG students are given end semester projects focusing the future prospects in the line of doing research and research oriented activities. This ensures that, at least few students who can pursue research will get through in the line of research. Because, the ultimate in education, in the ultra modern world is getting job opportunities and earning prospects, which will prevent even the research (doing) eligible candidates to curtail studies after just an UG course and tend to search immediate jobs. Hence, in every class hour, scientific temper is kept sustained by giving appropriate examples in science inventions and so on.

4. INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Augmenting infrastructural facilities as a catalyst for Academic Excellence has always been one of the significant concerns of the institution. For an institution of Higher Learning, infrastructural facilities andaccess to learning resources are necessary for meaningful knowledge transfer and creation. The grants from UGC, FIST &Management are optimally utilized to take care of the infrastructural needs of the ever expanding student base and increased Technological and Physical infrastructural needs. The college takes systematic steps to make sure that constantup gradation takes place in this front.

4.1 PHYSICAL FACILITIES

4.1.1 Adequate Availability and optimal Utilization of Infrastructure

The Madura College is endowed with excellent physical infrastructural facilities which include adequate class rooms, Laboratories, Staff rooms, Play ground to support the teaching-learning process. The college has made systematic efforts to upgrade its infrastructural facilities and to keep pace with new, supplementary and recurring demands. All Heads of Departments, submit their infrastructural requirements for the forthcoming year in March prior to the preparation of the budget for the academic year. The Time Table committee plans ahead for all requirements regarding classrooms, laboratories, furniture and other equipments.

This ensures that the management has sufficient time to acquire and replace some of the outdated facilities by the start of every academic year. Every Year Computer lab also reviews its computational infrastructural requirements and replaces the obsolete systems and servers with new ones. Infrastructural facilities such as furniture and air conditioners are replaced and augmented asthe need arises.

The College has evolved a system for the optimum utilisation of existing infrastructural resources. Certificate courses are conducted in the available class rooms when they are free. The requirement of space and the need for additional structures has been minimised by this strategy which ensures that the available classrooms and other service centres of the college are used to optimal level. Exams are conducted in auditoriums and department classrooms. Such efforts ensure that spatial demands are managed effectively.

The college makes optimal utilisation of one big auditorium asmultipurpose hall and used optimally for classes, short term club activities, yoga classes, examinations, college programmes, parent teacher meetings and various other events. Cho Hall is used for department activities and programmes. The Air Conditioned Seminar hall with LCD facility is used as anICT Enabled Small Auditorium with the seating capacity of 150. The FIST lab is also used as ICT lab for conduct of online exams, student presentations and viva voce examinations.

Transport facilities, through booking, are available for departmental activities, trips to places of academic interests and also for the various extension and taken up by the faculty members and students of the college.

Maintenance of computers, generator is done through the Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) while minor repair works are carried on request through the complaint register system. Constant and proper monitoring of infrastructure has helped the optimal usage of the existing facilities.

4.1.2 Creation and Enhancement of Infrastructure

The *Policy* of the college is to upgrade and enhance infrastructural facilities to meet the growing needs of the college in the Teaching-Learning process deriving benefits that would deliver better value for money, enhanced quality services, reduction in duplication of work and increase in efficiency.

The *Recent Initiatives* taken by the college are given below:

The College has been enhancing its Audio visual resources in the past few years. Most departments possess a mobile LCD projector with suitable accessories to ensure that ICT enabled teaching resources are used more frequently.

In the wake of the severe power crisis faced by the southern parts of Tamil Nadu, stand by UPS units are replaced by on-line ones in an optimal way for better performance of the computers.

A 125 kVA generator is in place to provide power at all times during the working hours.

The science laboratories are well equipped to cater to the students and research scholars. The following laboratories are very much in demand and cater to the special needs of the student body namely Language Laboratory, Computer laboratories, Bioinformatics laboratory, Computational physics laboratory, Crystallography laboratory, thin-film laboratory, UV-Vis and FT-IR instrumentation facility, Optics Laboratory, Multimedia Laboratory, Biotechnology Modular laboratory, Networking laboratory and the Microbiology laboratory.

The College is continually updating its automation facilities, which will soon be a complete database of all college information to facilitate retrieval and usage for administrative

and academic purposes. e-filing and e-databases have ensured that the sustainable documentation of all college information is possible.

The college has a 20 Mbps BSNL connectivity and have enhanced access to e-learning resources at the Departments, Library and browsing centre.

Collar mikes have also been provided to the departments for use in large classes to ensure effective communication.

Additional Parking lots meet the increasing number of the two and four wheelers of students and faculty members.

4.1.3 Departmental Facilities

Each Department has its own Department staff room with computers, which is similar to an office room. Larger Departments have been provided with an additional annex room. There are restrooms separately for students and staff. Departments also have their own lending and reference libraries.

Woman Faculty members and girls are provided with a dedicated Ladies Lounge facility on campus.

4.1.4 Facilities for the Differently-abled

The College takes special efforts to ensure the health and well-being of its students and faculty members. The College health centre has tie-upswithmedical practitioners for providing routine health checkups.

The College Health Centre conducts annual medical checkup for all students and maintains a record of their health status. Medical advice for further medical interventions is documented at the clinic and follow up is initiated by the Academic advisors of the Departments. The Health centre maintains and stocks the First Aid boxes provided at all major points in the college. The Health Centre attends to any medical complaint, maintains an arrangement with nearby hospitals and responds to any health emergencies.

Student Insurance Scheme has been initiated for all students on campus. The management also has special concern on the health of its staff and teaching community. The government aided staff members have been provided health insurance schemes. Maternity leave with pay is guaranteed for all women staff.

4.1.7 Special Facilities for Promotion of Interest in Sports

The undergraduate curriculum has one hour compulsory physical education class. All undergraduate students are trained in group events which are displayed on sports day. The college has a facilities for indoor and outdoor sports activities. There are three large playgrounds, a unique feature of this college and also a proof of the importance being attached to sports.

4.1.8 Special Facilities for Promotion of Cultural Events

The college has two well equipped multipurpose halls which are used for the major cultural events of the college. The facilities in each are given below:

Cho Hall

One Stage Projector (LCD) and two ultra-short throw audience projectors, Well-equipped audio facility and Desktop Computer with high speed network connectivity.

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
5. STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 STUDENT MENTORING AND SUPPORT

The institution is committed to providing necessary support to the studentstoacquire meaningful experience of learning, for their comprehensive development and progression.

5.1.1 Structure and functional characteristics of student supporting and mentoring system.

STUDENT SUPPORT AT THE ENTRY LEVEL

Help Desk at the time of issue and receipt of application

The institution provides a separate help desk for the students' admission by nominating a teacher, non-teaching staff and NSS volunteers. They provide detailed information about courses available, suggesting the course which would be suitable to him according to competency level.

On the date of receipt of application, the help desk is providing acknowledging the receipt of application and issue of notification of counseling intimation. Student can approach and meet the Principal with prior appointment.

Admission Committee

The institution is having a separate committee for admission. Every year, they will discuss about modalities of admission norms and procedure without any prejudice. As per the reservation policy of Government of Tamilnadu, the rank list is prepared and published in the college office. The student may enquire about his rank in the college office during the office hours two days after the last date of application. The admission process is completely transparent. Rank list of variouscourses is published following day of last date of receipt of application. Since the academic year 2009-10, we are organizing counselling system of admission for all the UG courses. Counsellingon one-to-one basis is given to entry level students for choosing their career by the HoDs and other professors of the college.

Staff Council

The Staff Council comprising Principal as Chairperson, all the Heads of the Departments, NSS PO, NCC Officer and Physical Education Director, Librarian frequently meets and discusses not only the progress of the students but also the issues related to them and also the schemes and support services available to the students. The Coordinator and the mentors of various classes, in consultation with the Principal who is the executive head of the college, serve the studentsthrough respective cells.

Mentoring

The institution nominates a mentor exclusively for every class to counsel the students and also to monitor the progress of the students. Mentors will maintain a separate note book about prospects, issues and challenges faced by the students and the mentor will guide the students accordingly. Mentors disseminate information on career opportunities and monitor students' participation and training sessions. A student representative from each class coordinates with the mentor of the respective class. The Principal, HoDs and the mentors of various classesserveas points of contact for the students.

The functional characteristics of the Student Support System

The institution provides the following functions towards a strong studentsupport system:

- Organizing orientation program for the freshers and the parents.
- Organizing a seven-day orientation programme(Bridge Course) for students of all disciplines.
- Arranging medical inspection for allstudents

- ② Camp organized by the NSS/NCC/ Health Club.
- ① Distribution of Identity cards to students.
- Providing good canteen facilities.
- Banking services to all the students and direct credit of students' scholarships to their respective bank accounts.
- ② Rest room facility to girl students.
- ① Distribution of various financial support schemes (scholarship and loans).
- ② Encouraging the students to organize and participate in cultural programmes(both on and off the campus).
- Providing a platform for students to improve their soft skills through Career Guidance Cell
- Workshop for Soft Skill is organized.
- ① Career opportunities (on-campus and off-campus) through Placement Cell.
- © Soft skill Development Cell and guiding the students for their employability through Career Guidance Cell.
- © Conducting Remedial Coaching classes, Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams, Banking, TNPSC, UGC-NET and CSIR.
- Provision for earning while learning for the benefit of students.

5.1.2 Provisions for academic mentoring

- The mentor nominated by the department sincerely and effectively monitors the progress of the students in the class.
- Redresses the emotional and academic problems of their wards.
- Guides the students in making the right choices regarding the Elective, Non-major elective and Enrichment courses.
- Records the progress of the students.
- Most of the Departments organize a Parent-Teacher Meet at least once in a year for interaction with parents and to keep them informed of the academic progress of their wards.
- Slow learners are identified and remedial classes are arranged for them to cope with their studies.

Men and Women Counselors counsel the students as and when required.

5.1.3 Techniques employed for the enhancement of personality of students

The student support systems of the College offer various possibilities for nourishing progress of students to make them employable with the support of following cells

Placement Cell

A Placement Cell, with a specially designated Placement Officer, for both day and self financing stream, and a team consisting of a link person from each department, is successfully functioning in the college by giving equal opportunity to each student. The placement cell keeps records of all the students who have been selected to various jobs during the campus interview. The performance of the students in the campus interview is ascertained through the panelists in the interview board.

Career Guidance and Counseling Cell

The Career Guidance and Counselling Cell provides consciousness towards self, society and environment. Three professors have attended workshop on counseling programme organized by Madurai Collectorate with the financial support Government of Tamilnadu. The Cell continuously exposes the students of employability skills required in the India and abroad. The main focus of the cell is to equip the students with good communication skills, soft skills and personality traits for an overall and complete development. Seminar and workshop on stress management help the students in achieving their career objective. This helps the students to face interviews and competitive exams. Relevant books and materials are available in the General Library. The availability of a professional counsellor at the college counseling unit provides the needed emotional support and therapeutic help for those students in distress.

Support Services for Differently Abled Students

Support services for skill development

- Students are trained in preparing scientific curriculum vitae which is very important for marketing one-self.
- The Physical Education Department gives special training to the students for joining uniformed services.

Support services for slow learners to avoid dropouts

- Dropout rate is very minimal in the institution. No student has dropped out of the course due to his/her inability to cope with curriculum. Some students dropped because of employment through Police, Indian Army, Navy, Women marriage, etc.,
- Bilingual remedial coaching is given to the slow learners to improve their learning efficiency.
- Personal Counseling is also given to the students to dissuade them from dropping out.
- The Mentor meets the slow learners personally and motivates them to improve their standards. Intensive pre-exam preparations are given to slow learners by the department concerned

Support services to expose the students to other institutions of higher learning

- The CGC encourages the students to take entrance examinations to pursue higher learning in reputed institutions.
- Visits to corporate firms, research labs and academic institutions of reputation enable them to make better options for career and higher studies.
- Awareness programmes to pursue higher and professional learning are conducted by external experts from reputed management and computer institutions.
- Post graduate students are encouraged to write Competitive examination for research scholarships.

5.1.9 Guidance / coaching classes for UGC- NET / CSIR-NET / SET and other Examinations

- The college takes adequate measures through CGC to prepare students for UGC-NET/CSIR-NET/SET, Civil Services and other exams.
- Coaching classes are organized in the campus with financial assistance from UGC.

5.3.3 Feedback on support services

The curriculum has been developed to promote communication skills in English, soft skills and computer skills. Emphasis is laid on spoken English.

The admission and appointment procedures are highly inclusive Government reservation rules are strictly adhered to in both. The staff of the college symbolize the rich tapestry of the social spectrum.

Ensuring the organization's management system development, implementation and continuous improvement.

The college is managed by the Madura College Board. The management committee meets periodically to plan policies relating to admissions, academic programmes, recruitment of staff and all matters related to the development of the college. The statutory bodies of the college are the Governing body, the Academic council, the Board of studies and the Finance committee.

The Governing Body:

The Governing body has been constituted with the recommendations of the UGC. It is instrumental and in the implementation of academic programmes and their improvement. It appears introduction of new programmes, fixes the college fee, examination fee and on recommendation of the finance committee, it works towards the overall improvement of the institution.

The president of the Madura College Board is the Chairman of the Governing body of college. The principal as head of the institution monitors the academic and administrative functions of the college. He facilitates the overall development of the college. He reports to the Governing Body regarding the academic and administrative prospers, admissions, examination results, financial details and other matters concerning administration. The principal conveys to the college staff details regarding fee structure and annual budget. He holds staff meetings to discuss matters relating to the college.

The Academic Council

It is constituted according to the guidelines laid down by the UGC. It approves the recommendations of the Board of Studies.

The Board of Studies:

They are constituted according to the guidelines laid down by the UGC and affiliated limit the Madurai Kamaraj University. They provide the content for various courses as well as innovations in teaching, learning and evaluation. Both the academic council and Board of studies meet once a yearor whereas necessary.

The Finance Committee:

With the principal as the chairperson, is an advisory body to the Governing body on matters of finance. Matters related to budget and income from fees are monitored by this committee.

The IQAC:

This body acts as a catalyst in improving the academic efficiency of the college. It plays a major role in promoting academic transparence and in inculcating best practices. Emphasis is laid on qualitative education and the need to cater to the downtrodden sections of the society.

The Vice- Principal:

He assists the Principal in the general administration of the college.

The office superintendent is responsible for the functioning of the administrative unit. The administrative office of the college, under the leadership and guidance of the principal and implements the suggestions given by the Governing body, the management committee and the finance committee.

The controller of examinations leads the examination office. His role is to ensure the effective functioning of the examination unit. He is instrumental in the conduct of semester examinations under the Autonomous system. He regularly consults the Principal.

The Heads of the departments – They have to take care of the departmental academic programmes of the college. After consulting the Principal, the Heads of the department implements the academic programmes. They oversee the academic quality of the syllabi for various courses.

Interaction with Stakeholders:

There is excellent rapport in the college among the management, faculty, students, parents and representatives of industry. Feedback is constantly sought from all these segments as regards academic quality.

Parents and community:

Extension programmes are conducted by the various departments. Parent-Teacher's meet is conducted and feedback is obtained from them. Members of the Governing Body and Academic Council provide feedback regarding the various aspects of the functioning of the college

.

Alumni:

The alumni list of the Madura College consists of several illustrious persons in the top echelons of the country. Our college has been one of the front ranking institutions of south India. The Alumni of the college – which consist of secretaries in the central and state government, top-level officers in the various sectors like army, police, higher education – speak with pride of having studied under legendary professors of this college. The alumni representative on academic bodies such as the Board of Studies, Academic Council and a helping hand in promoting the quality of the curriculum.

Students:

A student feedback is obtained at the end of every academic year regarding the quality of teaching as well as the content of the curriculum. The stakeholders offer regular feedback regarding the up-graduation.

Reinforcing culture of excellence:

Quality at all levels has been the hallmark of the college. 'Value based education' has been our motto. The college exemplifies the Upanishadic tradition of promoting values that militate against the consumerist values in the contemporary society. It is endeavor of the institution to cater to the educational needs of all sections of the society.

In order to provide qualitative education, the college has adopted the following practices:

- 1) Establishment of Internal Quality Assurance Cell inorder to impart quality in the academic programmes.
- 2) The college acquired the status of autonomy in 1978. It belongs to the first batch of colleges in India to obtain such a status.
- 3) Discipline is maintained on the campus. Regularity, punctuality and discipline are insisted upon for both faculty and students.
- 4) Skill development is inculcated among the students. The employability of the students is given special care.
- 5) Student participation is encouraged for extension activities, community development through NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross. The students are trained to be responsible citizens.
- 6) Guest lectures are organized to sensitize students as regards secularism, socioeconomic problems, social values and acquaintance with the spiritual masters of the world.
- 7) Extensive use of ICT for teaching.
- 8) Promoting research among the faculty members and encouraging them to present research papers in National and International conferences / seminars.

- 9) Encouraging teachers to pursue UGC minor and major projects.
- 10) Encouraging faculty members to publish research papers in peer-reviewed journals and research books.
- 11) Lectures for the faculty and students by eminent scholars are arranged.
- 12) Transparency in administration and financial allocation is maintained.
- 13) Reservation rules are followed strictly in admitting students as well as appointing teachers. Care is taken for accommodating disadvantaged sections of the society in student enrolment as well as faculty appointments.
- 14) The college incorporates technological innovations in teaching methods.

The scholarship of the teachers of this college have been recognized by the public over the decades. There is an excellent internal co-ordination and monitoring mechanism in the college. The administration in the college is transparent and there is decentralization at all levels.

Government reservation policies are followed rigidly in order to accommodate all sections of the society. In the appointment of the faculty members, state government reservation rules are followed.

Several welfare schemes are available for the staff. They include (a) Bank loan for the faculty members, (b) health insurance Co-operative Society.

Feedback is got from non-teaching staff, parents, alumni on the functioning of the college.

The Madura College, with its eco-accommodating grounds is the cynosure of each one of the individuals who enters its precincts. A desert spring of quietness, arranged in the heart of the bustling city of Madurai, The Madura College is a world in itself with its fine tartopped streets, cleared pathways, shady roads, assortment of trees, vivid blooming plants, well-laid out patio nurseries which motivate meditation.

The organization is cognizant and delicate to the upkeep of contamination free grounds despite being close to two main state highways on two sides of the grounds. It is enchanting to the point that students don't leave the grounds after their classes. They adore sitting under the trees visiting with their companions, perusing books, composing assignments, holding bunch exchanges and basically beginning at peace. Nature rich grounds speak to a thought to a large portion of the students.

Green view of the grounds is completed by the staff intermittently by directing to support the current trees and finding places for planting new trees. Personal experience of sowing seeds, watering plants, preparing and using organic manure, removing weeds etc., have ecologically been sensitized by the NSS Volunteers. They regularly conduct programs to establish eco friendly atmosphere in the campus. The government itself advises to avoid plastic materials to become eco conscious Hence thrust is given on plastic free zone in the campus. The NSS volunteers are extensively involved in campaigning against the plastic materials, collecting plastics and handing over to self help group to lay plastic road.

Energy Conservation

Energy Saving Strategies

- All the class rooms are adequately ventilated and well lighted and so do not require artificial lighting during day time.
- Students are instructed to switch off the lights and fans when they are not in use.
 Faculty members depute student representatives to check whether fans are switched off in unoccupied class rooms.
- ① The college has established computer labs and Research Labs. There are properly trained students to shut down the system and printers when they are not in use.
- ② Electronic equipments and gadgets are shut off when they are not in use.
- The dry leaves and the waste papers are not burnt but they are buried in the soil itself and Leaf litter from the campus is used as organic manure.
- NSS, Red Ribbon Club, NCC, Youth Red Cross in service training programmes were planned to keep the campus clean and conserve greeneries

Environmental Awareness through Curriculum

The CBCS has bent a helping hand to do our bit to the cause of appraising the value of environment to our students. It is fervently hoped that the programme adequately furnishes "value" to the cause of environment. Besides greening the area, keeping the zone litter-free helps aesthetics even as it promotes the idea of green manure form dead leaves. Thus awareness is getting established in the student minds.

Rain Water Harvesting

The College has installed rainwater harvesting on all buildings in an attempt to raise the subsoil water level. Of course, since it is a sprawling campus, not even a drop of rain water goes out or waste. There is an artificial pond in the entrance of the campus, in the heart of the Campus to which all rain water outside the buildings is channelled. The spent water of the reverse osmosis plant is used for gardening and other purposes.

- Solid waste management at source with colour coded waste bins are kept throughout the campus. Food waste from canteen is being sent to a piggery unit. Leaf litter from the campus is used for vermicomposting
- Segregation of plastic wastes is being done with an aim of recycling. Use of disposable plastic tumblers in the canteen and departments is strongly discouraged and use of paper plates and paper cups is encouraged.
- The college has trees and plants that make the environment carbon dioxide free. The campus has a botanical garden and a herbal garden. Biodiversity documentation within the campus, Naming of trees inside campus, Establishing & maintaining herbal garden. Tree planting within the campus and in the local community involvement students and faculty members of Environmental Awareness Programme, NSS programme and other programmes, do promote efforts of carbon abatement.

All faculty and students make a tremendous contribution through their presence and active participation. Students are aware that all staff by their positive attitude involves themselves in assemblies, acting as role models for the students to emulate. Assembly contains times of quiet reflection that enables students to develop the deepest values and aspirations of the human spirit. The students learn the values, life skills and understand the structured environment. Assembly develops a positive college ethos that conforms to the college identity and aspirations. The result being that the college lives in cohesive harmony that sustains the pursuit of excellence in all its forms.
D	The Practice	(i) Gathering: The students voluntarily participate in the general assembly. They take their position in silence preparing themselves for a week ahead.

- (ii) Meditation: The general assembly starts with meditation. The Principal, students and staff are involved in 3 minutes meditation. This component of meditation is included for the following reasons.
- a) Improved concentration: Meditation helps clear the mind from distraction and helps to concentrate in the day to day activities. Spending some time in meditation in the morning can help one to stay on task throughout the day. This helps not only to focus on task but also saves a lot of time and energy spent in unfocused efforts.
- b) Better grades: Students have found that their grades improve when they begin daily meditation. The overall improvements to one's life that meditation can often translate into better grades.
- c) Reduced Stress and Anxiety: One of the most significant benefits of daily meditation is the reduction of stress and anxiety in all areas of life. Practicing meditation not only calms one, but also helps to deal with difficult situations in a sensible way. This is very important for all the students, especially during those difficult times when they face examinations and projects to fit time limit.
- d) Sharper brain: Meditation has been shown to help students have a sharper mind in a wide range of areas. Meditation to also help the students to absorb information more quickly, comes up with answers to questions faster and a number of other benefits as well. It is clear that this important benefit helps college students as they are constantly loading their brain with new information.
- e) Better rest: Meditation helps in getting more relaxed sleep. More fulfilling sleep is essential for success in day to day routine. Having a more effective sleep cycle gives energy during day time. This improves the attention span of students during class hours.

AsatomaSadgamaya is a Shanti Mantra (Mantra of peace), it is taken from Brihadaranyaka Upanishads (1.3.28). It is used as a prayer in Indian schools, during spiritual/ religious gatherings, social events and other times; it is believed that the recitation of these verses bring peace.

(iv) A thought for the day

Various heads of the departments take turns and deliver a message on moral values and various aspects of life in a very interesting and impressive way. Emphasis is given on 'how to improve oneself'. This helps the students to realise that they don't need magic to change the world as they carry all the power needed, inside themselves already.

(v) Principal's address: Announcements

The students are informed about the happenings and events that are coming up and the role to be played by them. This will make them to realise their responsibility and contribution towards it. It also strengthens the bond between studentsand the Principal of our college. Communication regarding COE office such as details of exam fees, dates of summative examinations, details of scholarship and holidays are announced.

(vi) Felicitation the winners:

During the assembly the Principal appreciates the students who win prizes in sports, academic competitions and cultural events conducted within and outside the college. This encourages them to a large extent. The students participating in various curricular and co-curricular activities, both intra and intercollegiate competitions, are recognized, appreciated and awarded with prizes. This is a great motivation for the students to participate in such activities in the future also

(vii) Gift / memento for maximum utilization of library:

Being in a digitalized era, it is hard to find students reading books. The reading habit has declined among the youth, especially the college students. In order to inculcate the reading habit and further motivate them, a practice is adopted to award them a prize during the general assembly based on the hours utilized fruitfully in the Harvey library.

В	The Context	Since its inception in 1889, the College has been adapting itself to many changes in the curriculum. The global perspective of the college has also been a driving force to provide quality education to its students. Autonomy has provided a platform for each department to have their departmental objectives and design their own curriculum. The CBCS empowers the students to consciously choose a set of courses to meet their objectives. Subsequently, it may result in producing scholars with interdisciplinary background. While the philosophy was the same, its nomenclature was 'A Optional' in the second year and 'B1 and B2 Electives' in the third year. Intellectual depth and breadth characterizes liberal Arts and Science undergraduate education. CBCS allows students to cross the artificial boundaries of varied academic discipline and enables them to get the insights of several disciplines bringing out the inherent interest and attitude. Student can have prior knowledge of different areas and enjoy the liberty of choosing one of these areas in their future. Skill development being the most important aspect in the education system, it has been proved that Choice Based Credit

		System helps in enhancing skills in undergraduate and postgraduate students. The system provides flexibility in designing curriculum and assigning credits based on the course content and hours of teaching. Cutting edge developments generally occur at the interface of two or more disciplines. The interdisciplinary approach enables integration of concepts, theories, techniques, and perspectives from two or more disciplines to advance fundamental understanding or to solve problems whose solutions are beyond the scope of a single discipline. CBCS shall give the Institutes the much needed flexibility to make the best use of the available faculty expertise.
C	The Practice	Being a pioneer in the introduction of CBCS in Indian Collegiate education, the College has witnessed three stages of practice of CBCS. A student of arts could move to science Electives and a science candidate to arts Electives, in the second year of his study known as 'A Options' and in the third year students of both arts and science streams could opt for two courses in each semester either inter-department or intra-department electives known as 'B1 Electives' and 'B2 Electives.' Each department would offer a set of courses with adequate number as buffer courses. Divisional requirements had to be completed by a student of any discipline by earning 173 credits and later on 168 credits to be eligible for a degree in their course of study. Each part had specific credits to be completed by the end of the third year. The division consisted of 5 parts totally.
D	Evidence of Success	 CBCS is a student centric system that enables students to earn the required credits; Freedom to choose subjects which are beneficial for students. Restructuring of the academic programmes in terms of core and elective courses has widened and deepened students' perception of ever expanding human knowledge that does not recognize man-made artificial boundaries; Prospective employers find it easier now to identify the skilled candidates with wider range of subject comprehension; The exact and true performance level of students is being tracked now; and It has resulted in a paradigm shift in focus from teacher-fronted curriculum and classroom to learner-centric classroom experience to learning-targeted individualized, customized learning inputs.
E	Problems Encountered and Resources Required	The CBCS is a Western educational concept that is being practiced from the school stage there. Indian educational system needs to be seen as part of the Indian culture. Parents decided everything for their children from the beginning to studies, to profession, and to marriage. Hence, the privilege extended to them to make their own choices is not properly utilized by many students. As a result, they evolve their own parameters as follows: Juniors depend on their seniors and follow the same parameters



- Some of the parameters are at the level of the course (intermediate/advanced), classroom work (more or less number of take home/in-class work), the nature of the course teacher (strict/friendly, easy-going/tough), exam-related (high scoring/low scoring) and so on.
- > Students have an inherent tendency to view the CBCS courses less seriously than major courses.
- Students' behaviour seems to be different in major and CBCS classes.
- Most of the CBCS courses are skills-based and involve hands-on experience but student population crosses 100 in some and notakers in others.
- Some faculty members themselves would like to offer certain courses of CBCS nature as major courses at both postgraduate and under graduate levels for wrong notion of the CBCS concept.

Resources required

- More spacious classrooms are required for the CBCS courses.
- More smart room like classrooms with audio-visual equipment with the internet connectivity are also needed
- More opportunities for the faculty to realign their epistemological understanding of modern learning styles and strategies preferred by the tech-savvy present generation of learners are to be provided
- Students' need orientation on the CBCS concept at the school level.

9.Standardized procedures for periodic quality checks of Teaching – Learning The objectives/intended outcomes of this best practice are: Goal To ensure standardized quality learning and teaching experiences across all courses and programs and across differed modes of delivery. To improve student's learning experiences and outcomes. To assist in curriculum planning To identify and address professional development needs. **The Context** The innate attitude of any institution is to offer the best package of B knowledge dissemination. Since learning is a wider variable, the mechanics of imparting information require fine-tuned feeding suitable to recipients. The teachers strive their best to live up to the context. While innovative strategies of teaching are desirable, too little can be had by imposing conditions like prescribed methodologies. Simply,

teaching is an art; it can never be fettered by tools of regulation and practices of prescribed documentation procedures. The most adopt tool is **motivation**. Motivation emerges from success, and by wide appreciation from all around.

Under the system of standardized procedures the pedagogical tools adopted by most creative teachers get to be systematically documented and this can work as frame of reference for teachers who are not spontaneously creative. Senior faculty or sometimes even the youngest faculty coming from diverse backgrounds like industry etc., explore alternative pedagogies or adapt student-support to varied student profiles and pedagogical competencies. Their alternative teaching methodologies can serve as training models to other teachers. But can not be imposed as an industrial practices and teachers have ego to tow a line.

The individual performance of each faculty member is a crucial factor in quality teaching. The unit plan designed by the faculty becomes the frame of reference to make the teacher accountable for the status of syllabus completion. Yet, what matters is efficacy than any definable parameter of quality.

In the context of teachers moving towards greener pastures / IT Sectors, the need for adopting standardized procedures was deeply felt as transition becomes smooth when there is a switch of teachers as the former teacher's records becomes a ready reference for the new teacher. Seldom teachers excellence tally by identical terms of reference.

Through constant checks of teacher's documents which include their unit planners, academic records, teaching dairies, etc., the institution finds scope to identify areas of deficiencies and also take up appropriate faculty improvement programmes for the betterment of their professional effectiveness and also for the quality enhancement of the academic programme.

C The Practice

The procedures which constitute the implementation of the practice are as follows:


- ➤ The institution has a meticulously organized and clearly planned teaching, learning and evaluation schedule, well integrated into the total institutional scheme. At the end of each academic year, the management holds consultations with the faculty and the examination section to plan the Almanac for the forthcoming academic year.
- The course outlines and the course schedules are drawn well ahead of the course commencement. Each faculty of the department has an individually drafted unit planner, which

- reflects how each unit is taught by indicating the time frame along with a mention of methodologies/ references used and modes of evaluation practiced. The course outlines are spelt out to the students by the course teacher in the orientation session.
- Teaching dairies which have lesson plans of the topics handled that week are meticulously maintained by the individual teachers.
- The HOD/Dean/Director of each department ensures the effectiveness of the process by weekly or monthly checks of the teaching diaries, academic records and syllabus completion by the faculty.
- ➤ The teaching- learning process is continuously reviewed by the Principal, Vice-Principal, Director by taking into account the feedback given by the students.
- Each department submits an annual report on the activities comprising academic activities, research and extension activities, innovations in teaching/learning, publications, staff and student achievements, extra and co- curricular activities to the IQAC.
- ➤ To ensure quality sustenance and enhancement, the college periodically conducts the performance audit of the departments which includes course review, Review of Teaching learning methodologies, Result analysis, Research output, Faculty Development Programmes attended/conducted and Extension activities, Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities conducted during the year. The audit checks the progress and quality of departmental performance against the specifications spelt out in the Almanac and departmental vision.
- ➤ Departmental meetings are conducted once a month and in some departments even two / three meetings are conducted in two weeks time and whenever needed. The minutes are documented and signed by all the faculty members and the HOD.
- > Syllabus completion statements are also periodically submitted by the individual teachers in order to ensure timely completion of the syllabus.
- Feedback is taken from the students at the end of every semester for teacher evaluation.

Thus the regulatory mechanism of timely checks on teacher quality has the double advantage of improving not only teacher but also student performances.



POST ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The NAAC Peer-team visited our college on 24th - 25th February 2010 and Re-accredited our college at the A-Very Good (CGP 3.315) level. The committee suggested the following recommendations for the better functioning of the college in future. The management has strictly adhered to the recommendations of the NAAC Peer-team in maintaining quality standards in the teaching – learning activities of the college. The details are furnished below along with the recommendations and the enhancement measure undertaken during the last seven academic years between 2010-11 and 2016-17.

As an outcome of the re-accreditation process by NAAC in 2010, the college has taken significant quality sustenance and enhancement measures, keeping in mind the suggestions and recommendations made by the NAAC Committee. After a series of deliberations at various levels, innovative steps have been taken to improve the quality of the institution in the fields of Curriculum, Teaching- Learning and Evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension, Infrastructure and Learning Resource, Student Support and Progression and Governance, Leadership and Management.

As per the suggestions of the NAAC Committee, the UGC stipulation of 180 teaching days (five teaching hours/day) is strictly adhered to.

The admission process has been computerized. A software, specifically designed to facilitate the admission process, has been installed in all the departments. This helps the faculty in preparing the community wise merit list. Merit lists are generated based on their +2 marks for various categories - OC/BC/BCM/MBC/DNC/SC/ST/SCA, differently abled, and daughters of Ex- Servicemen. Prospective candidates are informed through post, e-mail, and SMS.

The College has initiated coaching for competitive examinations like NET/SLET and UPSC since 2010-2011. Coaching classes for entry in Services for SC/ST and Minority Students are being conducted since 2010-11.

Apart from the written tests, the three types of learning methods which are

assessed through rubrics are self study based on assignment / seminar / field trips, assessment of concept clarity through quiz and participatory learning based on systematic continuous assessment of the student participation in class.

The Management as an incentive towards promotion of Research began to felicitate the faculty who were recognized at the State, National and International level.

During the last four years, the Instrumentation Centre and the various Science Laboratories have been updated with the latest equipments from time to time.

More than 50 Linkages have been established with several institutions of national and international repute. The faculty and students are encouraged to explore and exploit the expertise and infrastructural facilities available. The possibilities of collaboration have begun to be explored with rigour and guidelines have been formulated for structured consultancy.

Keeping in tune with the vertical and horizontal growth of the institution over a period of time, several initiatives have been taken to improve the infrastructural facilities of the college. In 2015-16, 75201 sq.ft. with spacious classrooms and staff rooms were added. A fully air conditioned mini auditorium with a seating capacity of 150 has been constructed in Campus to facilitate the conduct of seminars and workshops.

Computers with net facilities have been provided to all the departments.

The office of the Controller of examinations has recently been provided with higher end HP Server with SUSE Linux enterprises server for maintaining high security of database. It is also supported with CA backup solution for their data backup. Dedicated Server Room is provisioned with Air Conditioner & UPS, thereby ensuring uninterrupted access for the critical Data and Service. Airtel 2 Mbps Leased Line connectivity & BSNL 4 Mbps Broadband Line as standby are provided for internet & browsing services.

The Campus infrastructure has been modified wherever possible to aid mobility of physically challenged students. Ramps and lifts have been provided especially for the disabled students to have easy access to class rooms. Special wash rooms on new blocks in Campus and special rest rooms are also provided.

Besides this, the formation of an Anti-Ragging Committee, an Anti-Sexual Harassment Cell, Student Grievance Redressal Cell ensure that the students stay in the college is smooth and trouble free.

A Centre for Women Studies has been established in 2009-2010.

A Placement Officer has been appointed to coordinate institute industry interface and organize student placement drives.

The formation of Arts Club, Literary and Debate Club, Quiz Club, Film Appreciation and Photography Clubs provides a platform to the students to showcase their talents. With the rapidly increasing number of quality programmes offered to students with diverse interests and talents, the various units of extension activities have made a mark in their respective fields.

Water purifiers have been connected to the water coolers to ensure clean and safe drinking water. A reverse osmosis plant installed in the College ensures pure drinking water to the students.

All the teachers of our college are encouraged by the management to publish research papers in various reputed national and international research journals.



8. Whether the Committee is satisfied with the present mode of the teaching methods adopted by the college,

Besides conventional teaching methods, guest lectures, tools such as end-semester project based dissertation, study tour and industrial visits are practiced for effective teaching, ICT

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enabled tools are also used to enhance learning curve of students. Remedial measures are offered to help slow learners. The Committee is satisfied by the approach adopted by the college.

9. Academic achievements of the students during the last 5 years in detail such as various ranks obtained by its students in the University Exams.

An institution with 1140 students when the college attained autonomous status in the year 1983 has trebled (3412 in 2016-17) its intake in the last 30 years and sustained pass percentage at more than 70%. Annexure IX presents details of course-wise pass percentage in the last five years.

The average pass percentage of the students is around 72.4% in the last five years.

University Ranks: Not applicable on account of being an autonomous college

Others

Four students have qualified SLET examination in the last five years. Students from the college participate in seminars, conferences etc. besides getting involved in extension activities as well (Annexure X).

10. Whether the committee is satisfied with the type of courses being offered by the college,

There are 31 courses presently being offered in the college (Annexure XII). Of these, eight courses have been started in the last five years. The college is also planning to start B.Sc. (Statistics) programme from 2017 besides a plan to launch an undergraduate program in Acturial Science.

11. Whether all the 'Teachers are in favour of getting autonomous status to the college,

Yes, all teachers are in favour of extension of autonomous status.

12. Any other information

Background of the college:

Madura Native high School Committee, initially managing two schools in Madurai, later became Madura College Committee and established the Madura College in the year 1889, with an aim to ensure quality education at affordable cost, to shape and mould students as worthy citizens, to lay emphasis on moral and spiritual values, to infuse ethics, values and responsibility and to provide academic excellence. The College has celebrated diamond jubilee in the year 1950 and centenary in 1989. The present premises of the Madura College are about 43 acres. With the active contribution from many donors the college gradually expanded its infrastructure facilities over the years.

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In 1978 the college became an autonomous college, one of the first nine colleges in the country to attain such status. In 2010 the college was re-accredited by NAAC at A grade with a CGPA score of 3.32. Six of its departments are recognized as research centres by Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. Most of the faculty members are actively involved in research. There are 22 research projects sanctioned to the college in the past five years by various donor agencies with a total of Rs. 1.94 crores grants.

Vision and Mission of the college:

To produce disciplined, competent, spiritually, socially committed and morally upright students through quality education and research

Library: The main library, also called "Harvey Library" located in 11,269 Sq.ft. area. It has a good collection of books, periodicals, digital resources, journals etc. A Total of over 30,000 books are available within three sections, viz. Reference section, Lending Section and Reading Section. Other facilities available in the library are e-books and journals made available under N-LIST programme of INFLIBNET.

To conduct seminars, conferences, meetings, etc., there are two halls with a capacity to accommodate around 300 people, besides an air-conditioned seminar hall (120 capacity) and an auditorium.

Sports Infrastructure: There are four grounds possessing various sports facilities in the Yoga classes are being conducted in the morning hours college (Annexure XIII). regularly, open for general public too.

13. Examination Reforms

Whether the committee is satisfied with the present mode of the examination being conducted by the college? Any specific method of evaluation which the committee would like to suggest to them may be indicted.

The College follows semester pattern with Choice Based Credit System as per the guidelines of Tamil Nadu State Council of Higher Education (TNSCHE). Students are evaluated based on their performance in Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and in End Semester Examination (ESE) with a weightage of 25:75. Tests, assignments, seminars, quizzes constitute components of CIA. Double valuation is followed and re-valuation facility is also in place. The College conducts supplementary exams for students who have failed in final semester and in a maximum of one paper in the previous semesters.

b. Interaction with Students / Teachers / Non Teaching Staff, give specific comments in detail for such interaction undertaken.

All the stake holders expressed solidarity and complete satisfaction with respect to the approach of the college management as well as efficiency of teaching faculty in effective implementation of State's education policy for autonomous colleges.

14. Administrative Activities (for review of Autonomous Status College only)

Whether the Governing Body, Academic Council, Board of studies and Finance Committee meeting are being conducted by the college periodically or not. Specific comments in detail with regard to resolutions passed by the above bodies in the recent past may be given.

Details regarding meeting of various statutory bodies in the college are enclosed as (Annexure XIV). The committee suggests that the college may adhere to the instructions regarding frequency of meetings to be held as per the UGC guidelines.

15. Comments regarding the self financing courses being offered.

The college is offering 23 courses under self financing stream. It is observed that there is a considerable reduction in enrollment in the streams of Humanities and Social Sciences during the last two years.

16. Comments regarding the fee structure being in force.

Basic fees for aided courses is approved by the State Government with an appropriate additional fees to be paid to the University. For self financing courses, fees is being fixed by the Management of respective institutions after evaluating the costs involved in running the courses. Fee structure of the college for the academic year 2016-17 is enclosed as Annexure XV.

17. NBA/NAAC rating awarded; if not, comments thereof:-

The Madura College has undergone two cycles of NAAC accreditation. In the first cycle in 2003 the college was accredited as B++ grade and reaccredited in 2010 in the 2nd cycle as A grade with CGPA score of 3.32 on a four-point scale (Annexure XVI). The college is currently preparing for 3rd cycle of NAAC accreditation.

Observations and suggestions of the Committee

Merits/Observations

- O The Madura College, Madurai, has completed 127 years of existence. It is one of the colleges in the country established before independence. True to its establishment predating independence the college had contributed in the freedom struggle. There are references of meetings conducted by freedom fighters in the college campus. In the long history of the college, the post of Rector has been held by many prominent personalities from the world of Letters, Art, Science, Philosophy or public life like Shri C.V. Krishnaswami Iyer, Sir S. Radhakrishnan, Sir C. V. Raman etc.
- O The faculty members are actively participating in research which is evident from 22 research projects implemented with more than 700 publications during the last five years. So far, six departments of the college have been recognized as research centres and 34 faculty members are recognized as Ph.D supervisors by Madurai Kamaraj University, Madurai. 64 students have obtained their Ph.D degree through these research centres. DST has sanctioned a total of Rs. 36.00 lakhs to departments of Botany, Chemistry and Mathematics under its FIST programme (Annexure XIX).
- MoUs have been signed with Institute of Cost Accountants of India and the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (Annexure XX).
- Several new species of plants new to the world are described by faculty members of the college.
- Postgraduate and Ph.D students have published their research in reputed refereed journals with a good impact factor.

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- The diversity and number of books per each of the departments is considerably high and hence noteworthy.
- The number of regular faculty members holding Ph.D degree is quite impressive (around 77%)
- 80% out of the total 43 acres of land belonging to the college is open space, utilized for sports and other recreational activities.
- The per capita publications as well as number of conferences attended by teachers is considerably high.

Demerits/Suggestions

- In autonomous colleges the fee fixation authority is the Governing Council which on the recommendations of the Finance Committee decides fee structure. The college needs to streamline effective functioning of these bodies.
- The period of 2nd cycle of accreditation of the college by NAAC has ended in 2015. The college would be submitting its SSR for the 3rd cycle NAAC accreditation in early December 2016 which will facilitate the process of attaining the status of permanent autonomy by the college.
- For a campus with 43 acres of land the security measures taken by the college look inadequate.
- The salary structure for the faculty members of self finance courses be made at par with the norms set by the State Government in similar category.
- The management may consider introduction of new faculty such as Fine Arts and Applied Arts, Management as well as new programs/certificate courses for skill development.

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Recommendation of the committee:

The Committee strongly recommends that the Madura College, Vidhya Nagar, TPK Road, Madurai, Tamil Nadu be granted ex-post-facto approval for autonomous status for the period from 2014-15 to 2015-16 and further continuation of autonomous status for the period from 2016-17 to 2021-22.
